<p>PSHE at our school is a programme of materials, lessons and strategies which enhance the culture of our school, by focusing on key life skills:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Character Development • Wellbeing • E-Safety <p>Our school vision reflects what we hope to achieve in PSHE and Citizenship.</p> <p>In God’s eyes, we believe, achieve and aspire for everyone in our school family to:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - stay as healthy as possible - keep themselves and others safe - have worthwhile and fulfilling relationships - respect the differences between people - develop independence and responsibility 	<p>Our programme for PSHE is supported by the PIXL resources, which include a set of attributes our children can draw on in all areas of their lives – Leadership, Organisation, Resilience, Initiative and Communication. These are then developed further through E-Safety, Physical and Mental Health and Well-being, and Learning how to live with kindness. Our RSE work follows the resource Teaching SRE with Confidence in Primary Schools, published by CWP. This resource meets the requirements of Statutory Guidance released by the DFE in 2019.</p> <p>A range of teaching strategies will be used, including; circle time, role-play, discussion – whole class, small group, 1:1, visitors e.g. Fire Brigade, School Health Advisor etc., stories e.g. exploring behaviour of characters, creative activities, and pupil initiated activities.</p> <p>Our PSHE and RSE curriculum follows a spiral progression, building on core concepts. Staff will also respond to the individual needs of their children and any local, national or international events or issues as they occur.</p> <p>There are weekly timetabled PSHE lessons, and specific events and activities. There will also be opportunities during collective worship e.g. stories and discussion, Celebration Worship. The whole school ethos promotes our work in PSHE and Citizenship, as set out in our vision and home-school agreement.</p>	<p>Through PSHE and RSE being well provided in our school everyone will feel happy, safe, loved and supported in a Christian environment.</p> <p>By developing links with the local community, inviting in visitors and taking the children on a diverse range of trips and visits, we are able to support our children to take their place in a challenging, but exciting world.</p>

<ul style="list-style-type: none"> - play an active role as members of a democratic society - make the most of their own abilities and those of others - behave in a socially and morally acceptable way including towards authority and each other - to become involved in the life of their community - to know about democracy and how to be active citizens - to know about economic wellbeing. <p>We want our children to be thoughtful, resilient and reflective learners, who feel happy, safe, loved and supported.</p> <p>Our school curriculum and ethos promotes spiritual, moral, social and cultural development and prepares all pupils for the opportunities and responsibilities within their lives and the ever changing world in which we live.</p>	<p>Each class is encouraged to use their initiative to act courageously when they see injustice or inequality, working independently or collaboratively to raise awareness and make positive changes.</p> <p>Due to the nature of PSHE education there will be matters of a sensitive nature discussed. Every session will start with a set of mutually agreed ground rules. Whilst we want our children to feel safe and free to ask questions and make comments about any matters they are discussing, all staff are aware of the need to handle any disclosures sensitively, following the school policy. Any safeguarding issues will be reported to a DSL in line with school policy.</p> <p>Parental involvement, consent and support is key to teaching PSHE and RSE. As such, parents are kept regularly informed of the PSHE and RSE curriculum for their child and are invited to view resources. The right to be excused from relationship education is respected.</p>	
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
